## A Message from Mrs McShane

Dear Parents/Carers,

The Year 5 and 6 girls set off in a buzz of excitement and ready for adventure on Tuesday morning, and I don't think they have been disappointed. They have had four days of high-octane activities challenging themselves to do new things and to really put our Cumnor value of courage on their agenda. I suspect they will be full of tales of what they have done before they fall into a happily exhausted sleep.

We have noticed that there is a growing number of pupils who are late being collected at the end of the school day; please be prompt to collect your daughter - and we will try to be prompt to dismiss - the 10 minutes grace before taking girls to after school care is for emergencies only; teachers need to gt back to their classes either because they are running a club or that they may have meetings to attend. Thank you.

Looking forward, we have our annual "Future Schools" event next week. This is held in our sports hall and is a "fair" of a wide selection of schools that we, and the Boys' School, feed into. There will be the opportunity to speak with their admissions teams and to find out a little more about the schools. A Q and A session in the hall follows this. The fair will be open from 6pm with the Q and A session starting

from 7pm. This event is open to parents of pupils in Years 4 and 5. Please park in the lane and enter the school through the gates at the bottom of the car park.

We look forward to welcoming parents to our "Look at Learning" events next week. We have split this into two sessions over two days as it was very difficult for parents to park the last time we held it. This is always such a lovely time for you to celebrate your daughter's learning with her. If the weather is fine, we will hold these mornings on the field so you may wish to bring a blanket to sit on. The doors will open as usual at 8am and we ask that parents leave by 8.30am so that we can be ready for lessons to begin at 8.40am. I would reiterate that this is not an appropriate time to engage with teachers about your daughter's learning and progress.

It is that time of year again that we begin to think about selecting next year's school charity. I thought I would outline our process so you can support your daughter with suggestions to bring to house meetings next week.

When the girls select the school charity, it really is a fully democratic process. We will have a series of meetings in houses for each house to discuss and select their nominated charity. The House Prefects then prepare a presentation on their house's chosen charity to present during our charity assembly. All the girls listen to and find out about the different charities and then they can make an informed decision about how to vote, girls and staff, will have official ballot papers and voting booths. The Charity Prefects will conduct the count and the new school charity will be announced. We do insist that the charities that are put forward are small, local, and for people, not animals.

This process will take place over the following dates:

- Friday 24th May Houses will have the first meeting to start to explore and discuss possible charities.
- · Friday 14th June assembly for House Prefects will present their nominated charities and pupils place their votes.

This election, not only teaches our girls about the democratic process but is also an example of how important, and heard, pupil voice is at Cumnor.



One of the benefits of having multiple sites is that all pupils have the opportunity to benefit from different schools' resources. Year 7 boys spent the day here cooking very delicious pizza for their lunch which they enjoyed as a picnic on the field before football in the MUGA took over as the preferred lunchtime activity. The South Croydon Nursery came over to see what minibeasts they could find in our

pond and wild garden. These mini excursions do take a little extra organisation but are always of great benefit to pupils.












































#### Year 3

They all produced some fabulous writing and they brought their own individual characters to life!







#### **Year 4 Science**




Alexandra and Libby did great work too - not sure how I missed taking their photograph!

Overnight accommodation was in authentic Stone Age Roundhouses and students were treated to a whole host of activities over the two day trip, including: Pottery, an evening bat walk, Orienteering, Spear-throwing practice, Iron Age warrior training, Flint napping (tool making), Jewellery making, Rune reading and Archery (as well as Prehistoric Marshmallow toasting on the fire!).

Here are some of the girls' favourite parts of the trip...

"On the residential, I really loved the FOOD, the sandcastle competition, all the activities and, last but not least, sleeping!!!"

"I really enjoyed the Archery. We all got three tries each and I got 10 points in total and almost hit the bulls eye in the centre!"

"I really enjoyed the flint napping lesson where we learned that flint is the second sharpest stone in the world which is why it was used in the Stone age for things like sawing, cutting, digging, eating and hunting. Waylon (one of the teachers), showed us how the tools were made by using a large, round stone to chip away parts of the flint to make a sharp edge."

"I loved spending time with my fantastic friends and terrific teachers. I loved how they really made us feel like we were living in the Stone Age. 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
















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# Music & Drama.....
